Highlights of Question & Answer session:	<p><i>Mr. Sharil: There is no way that a regulatory authority does not have any relationship with a ministry, but their assumptions of regulatory issues maybe different. I agree with a representative of MOI that a regulator and a policy-maker should be separated.</i></p> <p><i>Dr. Kim: In Korea we understood an importance of broadband services, but it took 20 years to develop appropriate regulations.</i></p> <p><i>Mr. Narmandakh, MOI: In Mongolia a regulator and a policy-maker can be separated.</i></p> <p><i>Mrs. Schorr, ITU: Is there any asymmetric regulation in Mongolia?</i></p> <p><i>Mrs. Tamir, CRC: Ex-post was used in Mongolia.</i></p>
