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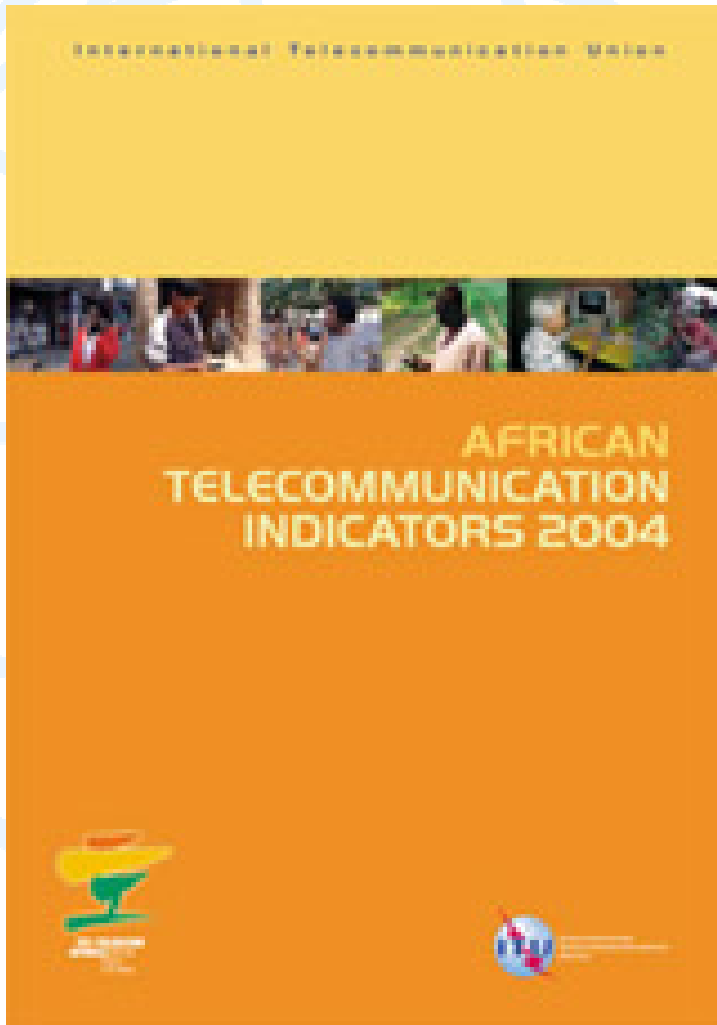

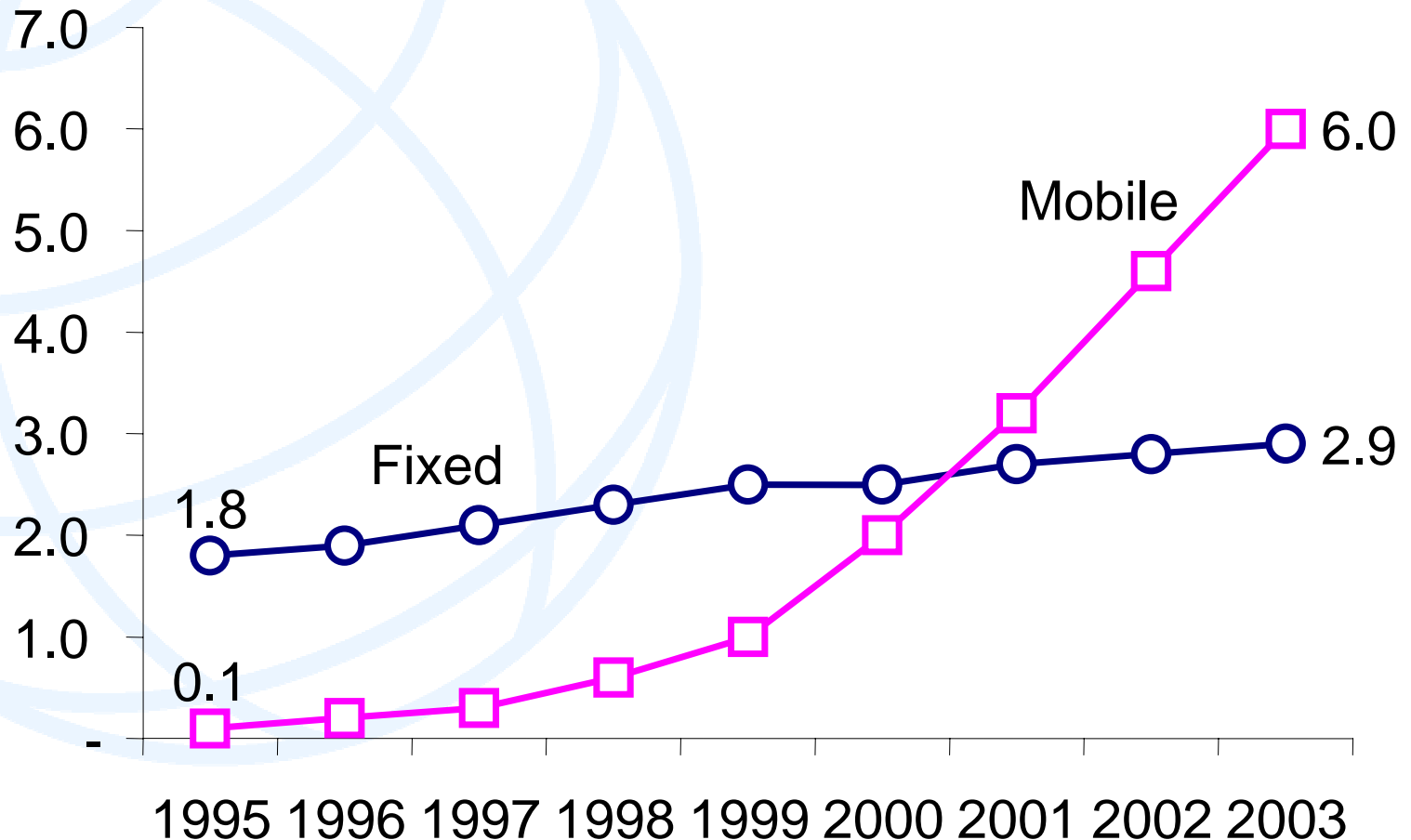

Telephone users per 100 inhabitants, 1995-2003

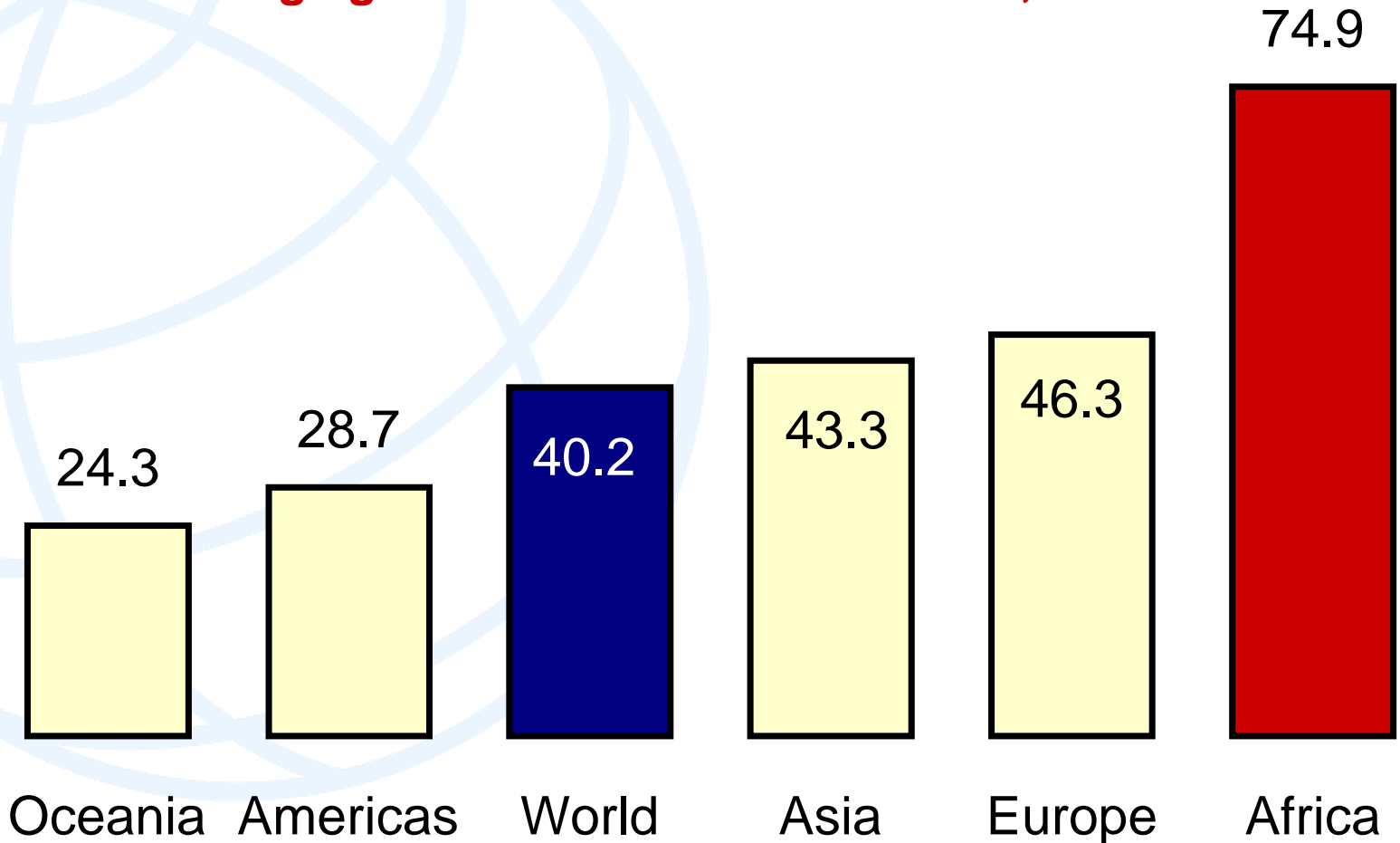

Annual average growth in mobile subscribers, 1997-2002



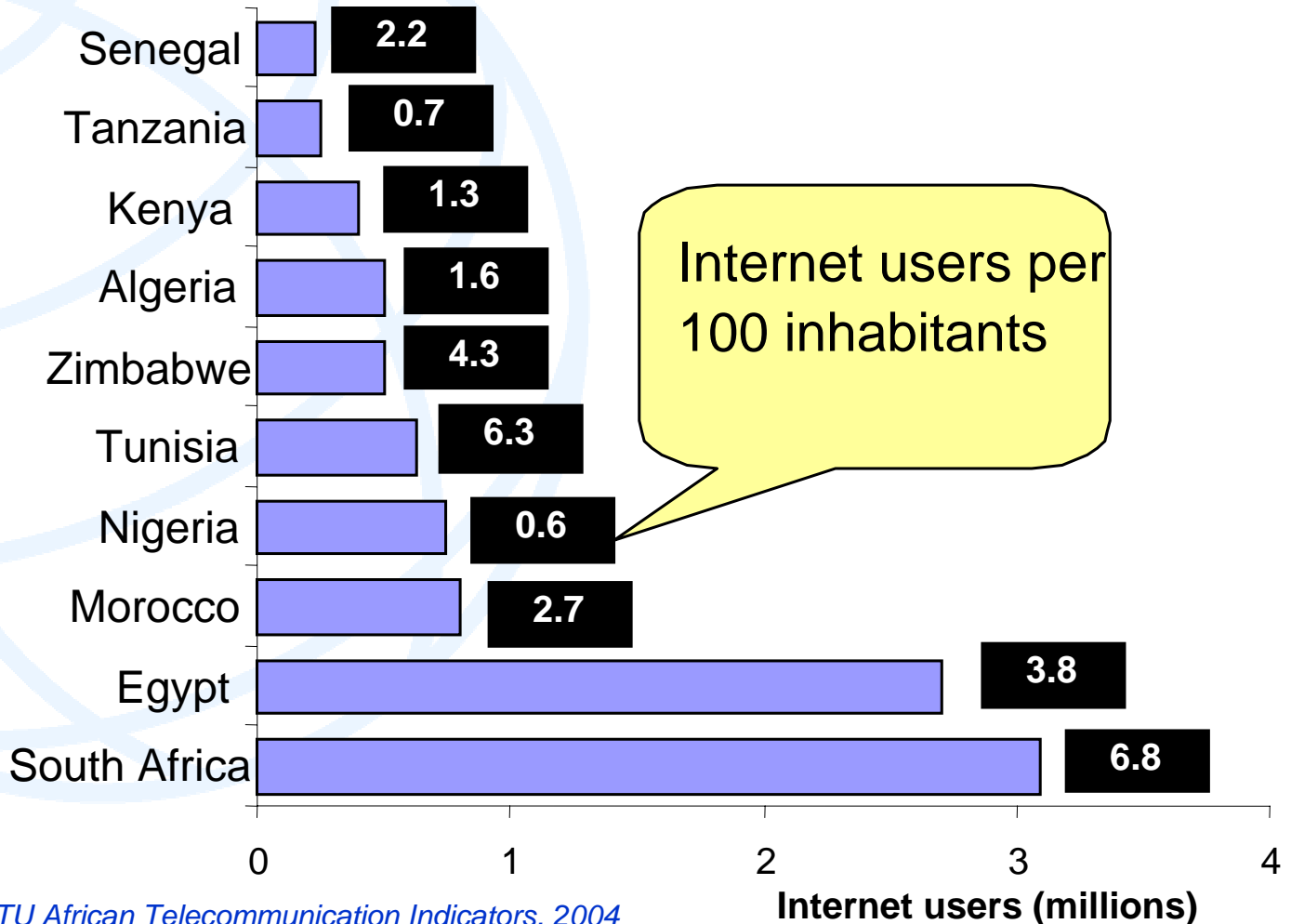

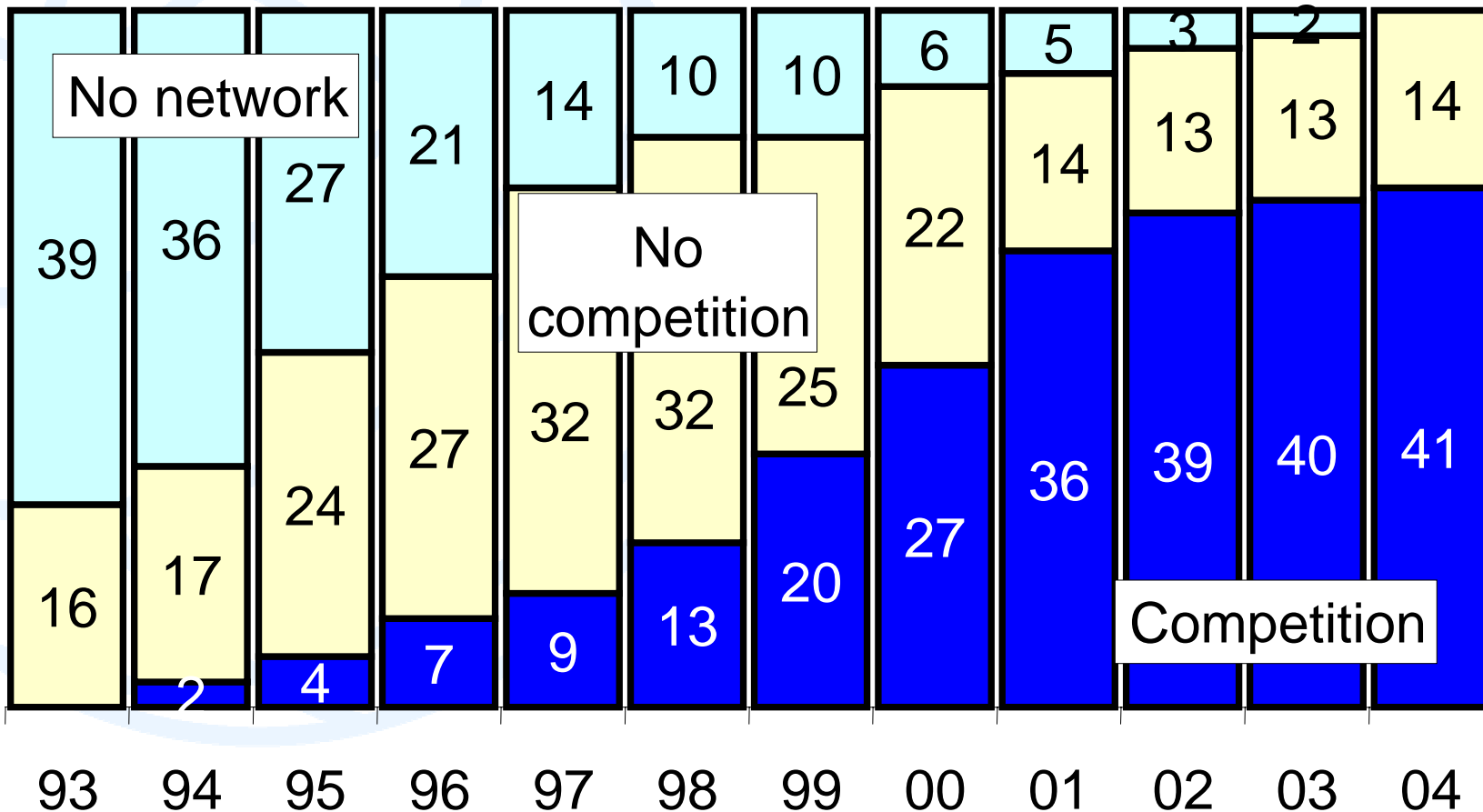
Top 10 African economies by number of Internet Users, 2003

Africa's markets are increasingly competitive

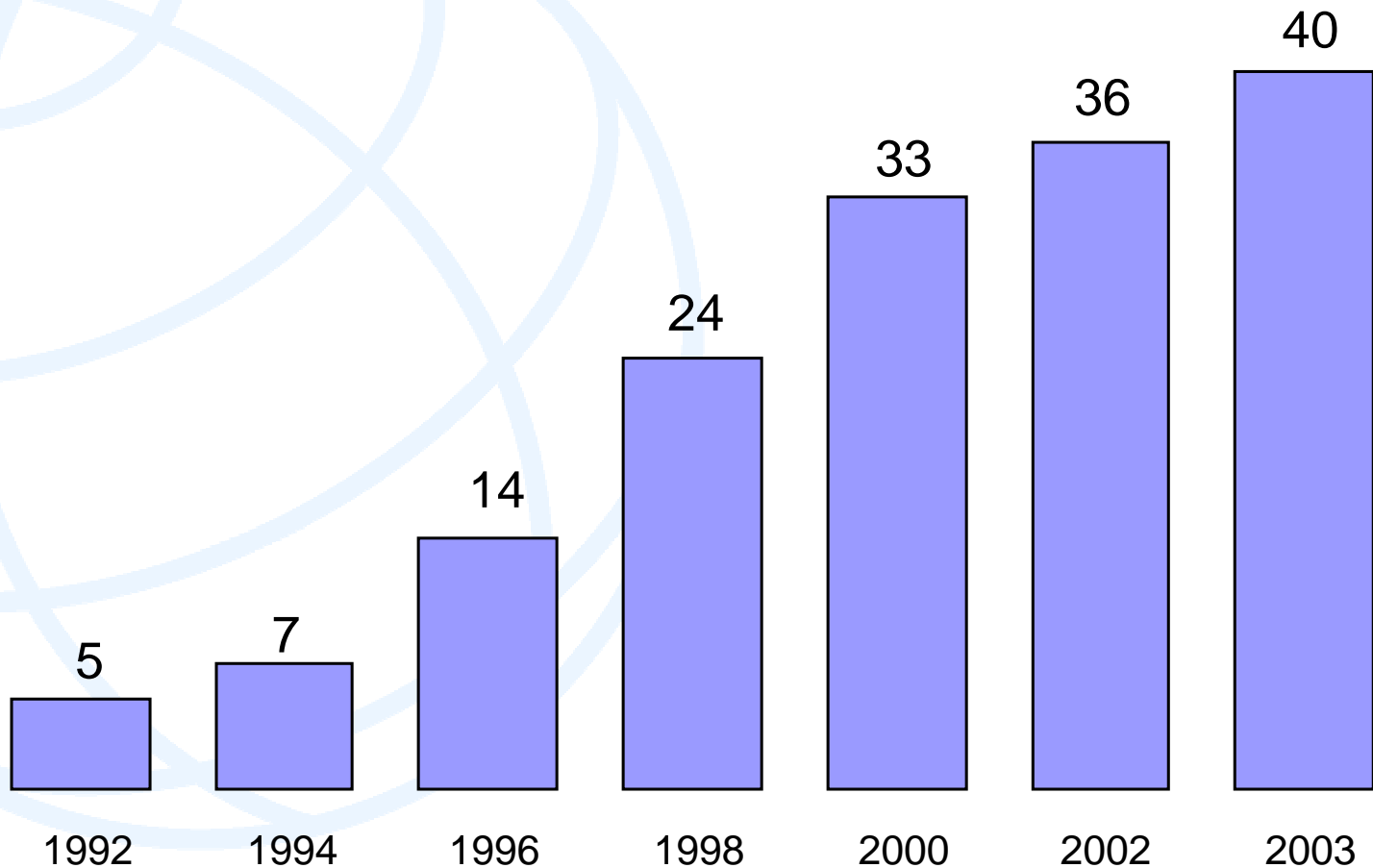
Africa's mobile market structure, by number of countries

● Follow-up to the WSIS

- Internet Governance, including management of Internet resources, SPAM, security issues, traffic flow etc
- Digital divide, including creating a digital divide index, technologies for bridging the digital divide, funding mechanisms etc
- **Research and statistics-based reports**
 - The Portable Internet, or technologies that fit between WLAN and 3G (e.g. WiMAX, Ultrawideband, portable Internet etc)
 - Trends in Telecom reform: Licensing in an era of convergence
 - Regional Indicator reports (Africa, Asia, Americas)

A brighter outlook for Africa

- **ICT market has doubled in size since 2000**
 - **More users added in the first few years of the new century than in the previous 100 years**
- **World's fastest growing mobile economy**
 - **Passing 50 million mobile users in 2003**
- **World's fastest growing regional Internet**
 - **Passing 12 million Internet users in 2003**
- **Competitive markets**
 - **75% of African economies have more than one mobile operator**
- **Effective, independent regulators**
 - **Half of them established within last five years**
