


### Africa now has <u>twice</u> as many mobile users as fixed lines Telephone users per 100 inhabitants, 1995-2003



**Top 10 African economies by number of Internet Users, 2003** 





Africa's mobile market structure, by number of countries



# A brighter outlook for Africa

- ICT market has doubled in size since 2000
  - More users added in the first few years of the new century than in the previous 100 years
- World's fastest growing mobile economy
  Passing 50 million mobile users in 2003
- World's fastest growing regional Internet
  - Passing 12 million Internet users in 2003
- Competitive markets
  - >75% of African economies have more than one mobile operator
- Effective, independent regulators
  - Half of them established within last five years
