## Address by the Director, National Telecommunications Corporation (NTC) To the Regional Development Forum for the Arab States (RDF-ARB)

New forms of solidarity and cooperation, new methods of social and economic organization and new ways of thinking are needed, especially in the Arab region.

Ladies and gentlemen, distinguished guests,

The principles and goals of sustainable development can be translated into concrete measures by encouraging the use of ICT-based products, networks, services and applications to produce a measurable impact on societal development and enable development goals to be achieved for future generations. In view of its involvement in all aspects of life and the growing reliance upon it in the development process, ICT needs to be put at the very heart of development. Its adoption by public and private sector institutions has resulted in improved operations and improved service to citizens. Furthermore, ICT is a key pillar of the knowledge economy, which currently holds sway in the developed countries. Application of such measures can help to foster and promote development in the following areas:

- vital State infrastructure (e.g. power stations, communication networks, water and electricity;
- e-government programmes and services;
- ICT-assisted learning (including e-education):
- e-health;
- e-commerce;
- ICT-based disaster forecasting;
- human resource development;
- other vital sectors (agriculture, housing, natural environment, etc.).

Ladies and gentlemen, distinguished guests of the forum,

We in the Arab region face pressing needs and major issues that we will have to address together, as one united Arab regional bloc, in order to serve the cause of ICT in the Arab region, pursuant to Resolution 31 (Rev. Hyderabad, 2010) of the World Telecommunication Development Conference, on the need to encourage members to participate in preparations for WTDC-17, in order to

achieve regional coordination before the conference itself is held. Regional development forums offer the opportunity to conduct high-level dialogue and cooperation and to establish partnerships between ICT policymakers, regulators, industrialists, academic institutions and regional and international development agencies and organizations on specific regional ICT issues.
