As the authoritative entity of the European NIS Directive, DSA's principal objective is to augment cybersecurity across all crucial sectors including energy, transportation, health, and digital infrastructure. The DSA also functions as the National Cybersecurity Coordination Centre (NCCC-CY) and Certification Authority in Cyprus, maintaining a strong collaboration with the European Cybersecurity Competence Centre (ECCC).

Additionally, the DSA carries out awareness campaigns regarding cyber threats, offers timely advisories, and implements advanced security services to strengthen the country's digital defenses.

About Cyprus

Cyprus, the third largest and most populous island in the Eastern Mediterranean, is situated between Egypt and Greece. Its history, dating back to the 10th millennium BC, is marked by significant archaeological sites such as the UNESCO-recognized Neolithic village of Khirokitia. As a leading Mediterranean tourist destination, Cyprus boasts a thriving economy. It joined the European Union in 2004 and adopted the euro in 2008.

About Limassol

Limassol, located in southern Cyprus, is the island's second-largest city and a beacon of cultural diversity. Spanning 1,393 km^2 with an 80 km coastline, the district is bordered by Larnaca, Paphos, and the capital city, Nicosia. Strategically situated between the ancient cities of Amathus and Curium, Limassol, with its rich history, offers a variety of museums and archaeological sites that reflect a blend of ancient and modern influences.

Entry Requirements

Admission and Transit Guidelines:

- Entry regulations are strictly enforced within the jurisdiction of the Republic of Cyprus.
 - All travelers must present a valid passport. Exceptions apply to holders of a Laissez-Passer issued by the United Nations, and documents for stateless individuals or recognized refugees.
- Citizens from EU countries, Switzerland, Iceland, Liechtenstein, and Norway may use their national identity cards for entry, provided these include a photo.
- Entry is denied to individuals holding passports issued by the the so-called "trnC".

Transport

Cyprus is well-connected by air, primarily via Larnaca International Airport, situated just 4 kilometers southeast of Larnaca city. This airport, along with Paphos International Airport in the southwest, serves as the main gateway to the island, catering to cities like Larnaca, Limassol, and southeast Nicosia.

Conference participants are advised to gather at the shuttle bus pick-up point at the airport for transportation to and from their selected accommodation units, with conference staff available for assistance throughout the process.

Weather Details

In Limassol, as well as across Cyprus, temperatures typically decrease significantly in November, yet they remain relatively warm. The average maximum daytime temperature ranges between 22-25°C, while the average minimum overnight temperature falls to approximately 13°C.

Time Zone

Eastern European Summer Time is the time zone in Cyprus (GMT+3).

Communications

The telephone code for the country is +357. Specific area codes for landlines are as follows: 22 for Nicosia, 25 for Limassol, 26 for Paphos, and 24 for Larnaca. Most hotels offer fax facilities and broadband internet connections.

Major Cities

Nicosia, the capital, has an approximate population of 200,452. It is followed by Limassol with about 154,000 residents. Larnaca and Paphos have populations of around 72,000 and 35,961 respectively.

Language

The official language is Greek, but a significant portion of the population is also fluent in English.

Religion and Traditions

One of the first elements of Cypriot culture that foreigners encounter is the warm hospitality. Cypriots are globally recognized for their genuine friendliness. The phrases 'Kalosorisate' (Welcome!) and 'Kopiaste' (Come join us!) are commonly used towards both locals and visitors.

Water and Electricity

In Cyprus, the assurance of food and drinking water quality is a top priority. This responsibility is diligently managed by the Health Inspectors who are part of the Medical and Public Health Services division under the Ministry of Health. Additionally, Local Authorities play a pivotal role in ensuring these standards are met consistently.

- Water Quality: Cyprus prides itself on its high-quality drinking water. Rigorous checks and measures are in place to ensure that the water is not only of superior quality but also completely safe for consumption. The island is free from any water-borne diseases, making it a safe destination for travelers.
- Food Standards: The food available in Cyprus meets stringent quality standards. Visitors can be assured that the food is safe, wholesome, and free from any food-borne illnesses.
- Health and Safety: Cyprus maintains a clean bill of health, being free from any perilous infectious diseases. This makes it a favorable destination for international travelers, who can visit without any vaccination prerequisites.
- Electrical Supply: For those planning to use electronic devices, it's essential to note that the electrical supply in Cyprus typically oscillates between 220V and 240V AC. The standard

frequency is set at 50Hz. If you're staying in hotels, you'll commonly find three-pin plug sockets, so ensure you have the appropriate adapters if required.

Traditional Foods

Cypriot cuisine, a delightful culinary mosaic, is deeply rooted in its Greek and Turkish heritage. However, what sets it apart are the intricate nuances borrowed from Byzantine, French, Italian, Catalan, Ottoman, and Middle Eastern culinary arts. Each influence has left an indelible mark, making the island's dishes a feast for the senses.

Spices & Herbs: The Cypriot palate is defined by specific spices and herbs. While pepper, parsley, arugula, and celery are commonly used across dishes, it's the fresh coriander (cilantro), thyme, and oregano that often steal the show. These ingredients not only add flavor but also encapsulate the island's rich history and diverse influences.

Signature Aromas: Walk through a Cypriot kitchen, and you're likely to be greeted by the distinctive scents of cumin and coriander seeds. These two spices, integral to many traditional recipes, encapsulate the essence of Cypriot cooking.

Mint - **The Cypriot Staple**: Mint's significance in Cypriot cuisine cannot be overstated. Given its prolific growth across the island, it's no surprise that locals have incorporated it extensively into their dishes. Ground meat recipes, in particular, often feature mint as a dominant flavor.

Macaronia Tou Fournou - **A Case in Point**: A quintessential example of Cypriot culinary artistry is their rendition of Pastitsio, known locally as Macaronia Tou Fournou. Unlike its counterparts, the Cypriot version is marked by a restrained use of tomato, allowing the abundant mint to shine through, offering a refreshing twist to this beloved dish.

Business Hours

Banks are open to the public from Monday to Thursday, 08:00-14:30, and on Friday from 08:00-14:00.

They are closed on weekends and public holidays. However, some banks situated in central tourist areas extend their operating hours into the afternoon specifically to accommodate tourists.

Shops

Typically, shops are open from 07:00 to 21:00 from Monday to Saturday. However, these hours may vary slightly depending on the type of shop and its location. On Sundays, shops generally open later, around 11:00, and close anytime between 14:00 and 22:00, subject to the type of store and its location.

Health and Safety Information

Cyprus upholds an exceptional reputation as a safe and friendly destination. To maintain this, it's advisable to take basic precautions to protect your belongings effectively. Compared to other places, Cyprus has a notably low crime rate.

Medical Services

Medical care in Cyprus is provided through Government General Hospitals and private clinics/hospitals, as outlined in the Emergencies/Hospitals section. Most doctors are proficient in English, and nursing staff can communicate in various languages. All Government General Hospitals, along with certain private clinics, have Accident and Emergency Departments for urgent cases. Private doctors are available for visits on weekdays from 09:00 to 13:00 and 16:00 to 19:00.
