We have an array of Internet development programs that are aimed at promoting investment in Internet development in Africa. These programs include; capacity building, research, technological collaboration, and related efforts to ensure Africa has a safe and reliable Internet connection, while supporting the region's long-term digital development

1. The [AFRINIC Fellowship Program](#) creates a network of African ambassadors to promote AFRINIC's mission. It offers African citizens opportunities to engage in public policy meetings, fostering future Internet leaders. Over 230 fellows from 50 African countries have benefited from this initiative, with AFRINIC covering expenses to ensure maximum impact. Expanding these opportunities will further contribute to a secure, affordable, reliable, and available Internet.

2. The [Technical Community Development Program](#): In recognition of the vital role technical communities play in Internet development, AFRINIC collaborates with groups like AfNOG, sdNOG, and IXPs to provide resources for growth and skill development. This program empowers these communities to drive Internet expansion and stability in Africa.

3. The [Internet Governance and ICT Initiatives Development Programme](#) empowers stakeholders in Internet governance, fostering participation in global discussions. AFRINIC actively supports national and regional Internet Governance Forums, facilitating open and inclusive dialogue among stakeholders. With significant participation in over 40 Internet Governance events, AFRINIC contributes to shaping Africa's Internet future.





4. The [African Research Collaboration Program](#): Through partnerships with educational institutions, AFRINIC conducts research to empower network operators and end-users in Africa. This program sponsors impactful projects, offers skills development, and forms strategic partnerships to advance knowledge and innovation in Internet technology on the continent.

5. The [Critical Infrastructure Development Program](#) focuses on expanding essential Internet infrastructure in Africa. By providing financial support and technical expertise, AFRINIC aids the implementation of crucial Internet components such as Internet exchange points and domain name systems. This initiative aims to establish a more accessible, dependable, and secure Internet across Africa.

6. To address underrepresentation in ICT initiatives, AFRINIC implements the [Diversity in ICT Program](#). It aligns with the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals by promoting gender equality and empowering underrepresented groups. AFRINIC advocates for diversity in ICT development and collaborates with organizations like RIFEN to create a more inclusive and innovative Africa.
