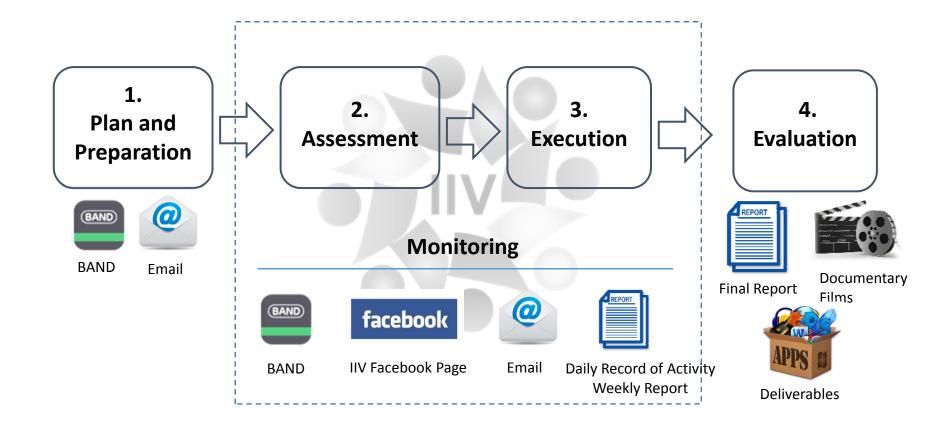

It's been over 3 weeks since arrival in Sri Lanka atready. Long but short amount of time, but many big and small hardships existed on a daily basis. My teammates and I were all eager to get through all of those, but the biggest obstacle for us was 'communication'.

When we were being dispatched, we weren't given much information about the VTC that we will be staying at. With basic information we were given with, we have prepared as much as we could to provide utmost quality classes to hetp these 'physically disabled' students get proper jobs after graduation, when we got there, we were shocked to find out that the majority of the students were deaf. English translation seemed pointless at this point, since the students wouldn't be able to understand them anyways.

The classes were not so efficient, since there needed to be 4 steps in translation: Korean-English-Sinhala-Sign Language. Direct communication with the students was absolutely impossible. Since none of the

teammates spoke Sinhala or sign langauge. This ultimately led to being unable to get close to students. There was an unspoken and invisible barrier between the students and the ICT volunteers. It was more like foreigners to locals, Sri Lankans to Koreans, and ultimately Sinhala speakers to non-Sinhala speakers to.

The language barrier deterred us from multiples of things. The classes were not covering as much material and points that we needed to cover since the time for translation was double the expectancy; whenever students had personal questions or needed help to figure something out on their own on photoshop, we needed to wait for our local IT instructor, Mr. Indunil, to finish helping other students, since he was the only one who spoke all three languages, English, Sinhala and English. It was a frustrating situation for everybody. The team wanted to find a solution to be more efficient and effective. Then, on the spur of the moment, one of us yelled out, "why can't we just learn the sign language? We learn it at school or church in Korea anyways."

That was it. It was as simple as that. Sign language for classes wasn't something that we needed to learn completely different alphabets like learning Sinhala. So we decided to give it a go. We didn't need much help. We just started copying what the students do. Before we decided to learn the sign language to communicate, we didn't really notice, but soon did we realize that the students have been trying to communicate with us using sign language all along. After learning step by step, we realized that the students' hand gestures during coffee break and lunch break mean things such as "did you eat?" or "are you hot?" The students were eager to tech us sign language as well. This made us feel a bit warm inside since this was a sign of proof that they wanted to communicate with us as much as we wanted to communicate with them as well.

We got more attached to students within the past 1 week than the first 2 weeks we have been here thanks to being able to Continue Reading Next Page

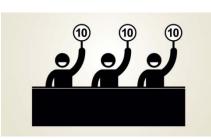
