- Also G20 digital track (under Italian presidency) has focused on Children and their needs

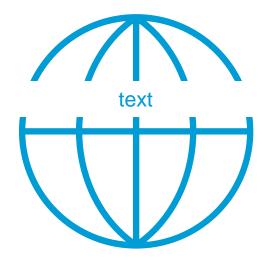


Italian privacy authority and Tik Tok

January 21: Dead by suffocation in Palermo of a 10 years' old girl registered as being 13 years old

From 9 February 2021 Tik Tok restarts its operations in Italy but engages to make age verification on all its Italian clients

September 17 the most important Italian newspaper publish the case of a senior journalist that opened an account pretending to be a teen-ager. No verification from Tik Tok



January 22, 2021: Italian
Privacy authority suspends all
Tik Tok activities all over Italy

On going: accounts of children under 13th are closed. Tik Tok verification system is made through A.I.

Italian privacy authority urges Irish privacy authority to apply sanctions

Child on line protection can only succeed if it is a collaborative effort in which everybody plays a part

Regulators, national authorities and operators are those operating on the field. National authorities needs to set the scene, bring to a table of discussion operators, fix guidelines and make all operators accountable. ITU through its guidelines and COP initiative it's a stimulus and a valid support to kick off the process.
