Digital Child Rights Foundation pledges its Digital Child Rights Desk Project with the objective to protect, empower and meaningfully connect children digitally in a century where these are an essential part of their human rights. It's important to work on more and better rights for every child in the digital world. As a foundation, we focus on improving and accelerating digital awareness, education and participation of all children and young people in every city in every country. Digital Child Rights are based on the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child and the UN General Comment 25. As Digital Child Rights Foundation we have developed a Child Rights PLAY Toolkit for children and young people. With our youth awareness and participation program we want to reduce youth unemployment and give every child and young person enough chances. We want to learn and train young people about children's rights in the digital environment. We want to share our Child Rights PLAY Toolkit and give them the opportunity to become a freelance trainer (internship) at our Digital Child Rights Desk in every country and city. Young people can earn money by promoting digital child rights and by giving guest sessions in schools.

Our youth awareness and participation program is based on our physical toolkit Child Rights PLAY and our online platform childrightsplay.com. The Child Rights PLAY trainers will give workshops on schools using our Child Rights PLAY Cards to teach children about their rights in the digital world. In the end, the children and young people in schools give their opinion and feedback about their digital life. Based on our Digital Child Rights Panel the young trainers can create a (online) Digital Child Rights Report to share with parents, teachers, Municipality, ITU etc. We focus on young people to become a freelance trainer. They are between 18 and 30 years old. The trainers go to schools to primarily give guest lessons to children between the ages of 12 and 18.

Our Foundation has a global scope. We started with our tools, program and platform in The Netherlands, Spain and Jordan. We now rollout to Malawi and have plans to start in other European countries (cities).
