NATIONAL LEGISLATION

• <u>Divisions 273 and 474 (subdivisions D-F)</u> of the Criminal Code.

NATIONAL STRATEGY

- The Australian government is seeking to establish a <u>range of measures to improve the online</u> <u>safety of children in Australia</u>, 2014.
- A public consultation has been made on the subject of <u>Enhancing online safety for children</u>, January 2014.

UN CONVENTION

• Signed and ratified, with no declarations or reservations to articles 16, 17(e) and 34(c), the Convention on the Rights of the Child.

UN PROTOCOL

• Signed and ratified, with no declarations or reservations to articles 2 and 3, the <u>Optional</u> <u>Protocol to The Convention on the Rights of the Child on the Sale of Children, Child Prostitution</u> and Child Pornography.

INSTITUTIONAL SUPPORT

- <u>www.staysmartonline.gov.au</u> provides information on cybersecurity for Australian internet users and does have a specific space for the youth.
- The Australia's National Computer Emergency Response Team (<u>CERT Australia</u>) does not provide specific information on child online protection but presents a link to the Government's initiative StaySmartOnline.
- The Australian Communications and Media Authority (<u>ACMA</u>) provides information on internet safety for parents and carers.
