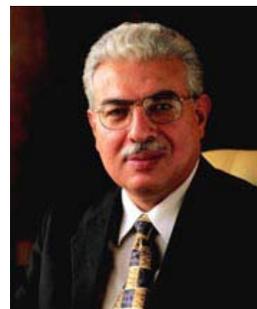

Introduction

The Youth Forum at ITU TELECOM AFRICA 2004 is the second Youth Forum organized during an ITU TELECOM AFRICA event, and is designed to introduce the Youth Fellows from all over Africa to the challenges and opportunities of the information and communication technology (ICT) sector. In the course of a three-day programme, the Youth Forum will address three basic themes: technology and applications; telecommunication policies and regulations; and finance and business, as well as the relationships among these themes. It will show how these are fundamental to the sector and examine how all players involved can interact successfully, and for their mutual benefit, to ensure that ICTs serve as a prime mover both of economic and social development and of the fundamental human right to communicate and access information.

The participants of the Africa Youth Forum will have the opportunity to attend a programme designed especially for them, benefiting from interactive discussions and mentoring opportunities with eminent leaders in the ICT field. Youth Fellows will also have opportunities to attend the ITU TELECOM AFRICA 04 Forum, visit the exhibits and interact with other participants. It is the wish of the organizers and sponsors that Youth Fellows emerge from this event with a view that the ICT sector is an exciting and vibrant one that is fundamental to the development of their countries and the region; and that the sector requires an extraordinary variety of skills and competencies in the present and future, i.e., lawyers, economists, engineers, etc. There is challenging road ahead, offering opportunities for those who wish to make a valuable and meaningful contribution, either professionally and/or personally.

Legacy wireline telecommunication networks in Africa generally did not succeed in providing adequate telecommunication services. When the majority of a nation’s people do not have access to telecommunication infrastructure, they are also denied the economic, social, educational and other benefits that ICTs deliver. How can wireless and other technologies and IP-enabled services be deployed to bring Africans relevant, affordable and reliable ICT applications? The introduction of mobile services, such as GSM telephony, has led to a telecom revolution in many African countries. In most cases, the number of mobile connections is now higher than the number of fixed-line connections, and it has taken the new players very few years to achieve this level of penetration. Prices on mobile connections and traffic have decreased significantly, mainly due to the increased competition in the market and to more efficient and flexible technologies. Most countries now have at least two mobile operators; and in some countries, up to five mobile licences have been issued. Wireless broadband, satellites and next-generation mobile communications promise Africans enhanced potential for access to broadband services, including Internet and inexpensive voice options such as Voice over IP (VoIP). Advances under way in multilingual domain names, digital conversation and the introduction of IPv6 will ease the use and open up new opportunities for Africans. This session will provide Youth Fellows an opportunity to understand and discuss new technologies and applications and their implications for the African continent.

A major focus of both ITU and African regional and national telecommunication organizations is the expedited achievement of universal access for all people to basic telecom and ICT services (voice, data and multimedia). To meet this goal, national governments have found it important to define and adopt clear and effective policies and regulations to guide the fast-paced change in the telecom and ICT environment. The result has been significant sector reform, including the establishment of regulatory authorities by most African governments. Key objectives of sector reform are to: ensure everyone’s right to telecom/ICT access (telecommunications within easy reach from public access points or shared facilities); improve telecommunication service coverage and quality; reduce prices; multiply choice; promote innovation in service provision; create a clear, predictable and stable regulatory environment to attract investment (national and foreign); and establish a clear set of rules defining the responsibilities of the regulatory authority. Governments face many challenges in achieving these objectives, including the need to balance interests between public policy objectives and the needs and realities of business.

To achieve their mandate, successful regulators and policy-makers require a variety of qualified professionals, including lawyers, economists, managers and technical experts.

There is little doubt today that a well functioning and pervasive ICT infrastructure is essential to a country's social and economic development. Building and operating nationwide networks and services in Africa require new business models and an investment-friendly, or "enabling", environment. The World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS) in 2003 adopted a Declaration of Principles and a Plan of Action for creating such an environment and, by 2015, for achieving many of the Millennium Development Goals adopted by the United Nations in 2000. One centrepiece of the WSIS Declaration and Action Plan is recognition that new kinds of partnerships involving government, business and civil society will be required to forge sustainable business approaches and attract investment for the build-out of ICT infrastructure and services. Africa offers enormous growth potential for ICT companies, but potential investors still tend to view doing business in Africa as high risk. Each stakeholder – the potential investors (local, national and international), the ICT companies or other entities that might create applications using ICTs, governments, and regional/international organizations – has its own perspective, objectives and requirements. This session will examine the financial and business dynamics of building sustainable ICT services from the perspective of multiple stakeholders, and will explore opportunities for youth to develop ICT-enabled businesses.

Immigration and Custom Formalities

Immigration formalities to enter Cairo are fairly straightforward. A passport (that must be valid for six months before expiring) or visa is essential for entry to Cairo (as applicable).

Event posters will be posted at the designated immigration counters to facilitate the immigration process of the event participants. To assist the immigration officials and the Cairo Chaperone Group members in identifying you as a participant of the Youth Forum, please hold in your hand upon arrival the letter which will be e-mailed or faxed to you before your arrival. It will also assist you for identification purposes during your release/baggage claim.

Airport Transfer

ITU TELECOM AFRICA 2004 Chaperones will greet you upon your arrival at Cairo Airport.

You will be escorted to an awaiting coach for transfer to the Cairo Ramses Hilton Hotel (your accommodation during your stay). You will be given a short briefing during the trip to your hotel on the activities on your arrival day and throughout the course of the week. About Cairo

Climate

During early May, the weather in Cairo is usually warm and dry with temperatures ranging between **28** and **31**. For more details, please refer to this website: **CNN WEATHER FORECAST**

Currency

The local currency is the Egyptian Pound (EGP). The Egyptian Pound is pegged to the USD at a rate of USD 1 = EGP 620.00, although the rate does vary slightly. Denominations include EGP 10, EGP 20, EGP 50 and EGP 100 notes. Coins come in denominations of 5, 10 and 25 piasters.

Cairo is a major international city and all major currencies and travellers' cheques can be exchanged during working hours. An exchange service will also be available at the Cairo International Convention and Exhibition Centre. More details will be given during the briefing session.

Electricity

The voltage in Cairo is 220 volts, 60 cycles. The plug/socket system in Cairo is a 2-round-pin type. If you bring your own electrical equipment, please remember to bring the necessary adaptors.

Water

All water comes direct from government mains in Cairo and satisfies the United Nations World Health Organization standards. Bottled water is widely available in supermarkets.



Cairo Identification

Visitors should carry a passport with entry visa (if required) or other identification with a photograph at all times during their stay in Cairo. Your passport will be sufficient.

Local Time

At this time of year, the local time in Cairo is GMT +2.

Population

More than 14 million people live in Cairo. Almost 95% of the population is Arab-speaking. English is also widely spoken.

Telecommunications

Local calls can be made from the Ramses Hilton Hotel in Cairo where there are coin phones costing 30 piasters per minute. If you wish to make long-distance calls, arrangements should be made with the hotel receptionist. You are advised to make calls in public coin boxes or use card phones.

The country code for Egypt and Cairo is +20 2. If you want to make local calls, dial directly the local telephone number. The normal prefix for making overseas call is +20 but the exact prefix and manner of dialling varies with different phone operators, and visitors should follow dialling instructions printed on their phone cards.

At the Cairo International Convention and Exhibition Centre Youth Forum Lounge, access to the Internet is available.

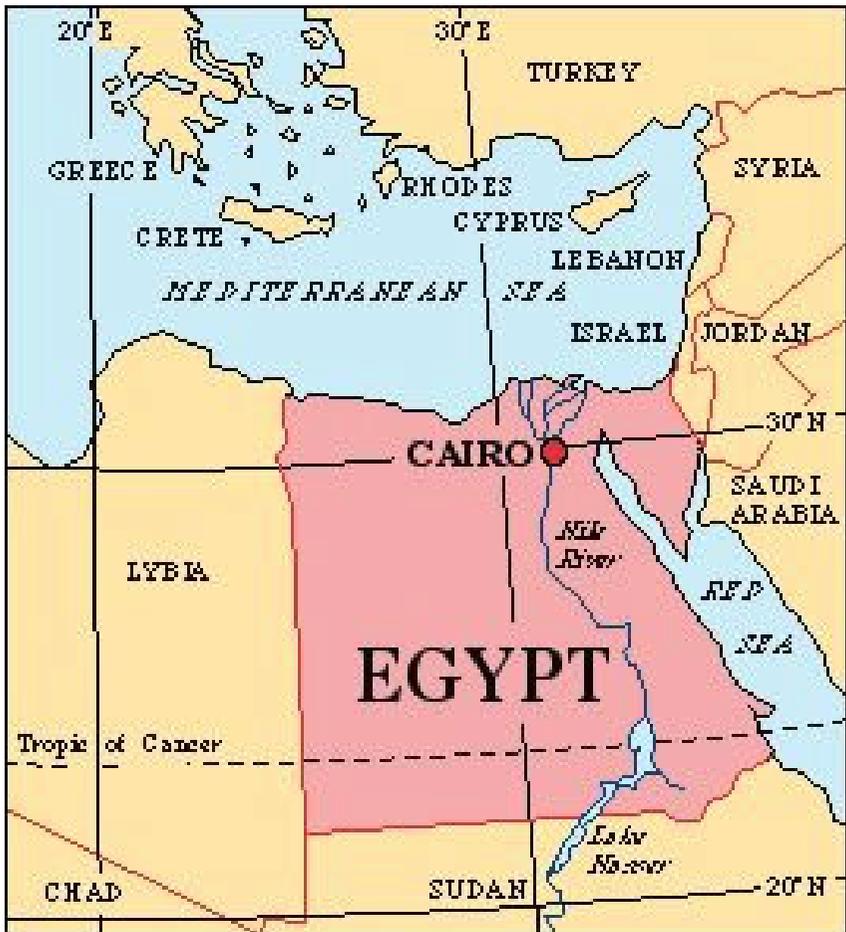
- Be punctual for all sessions and functions

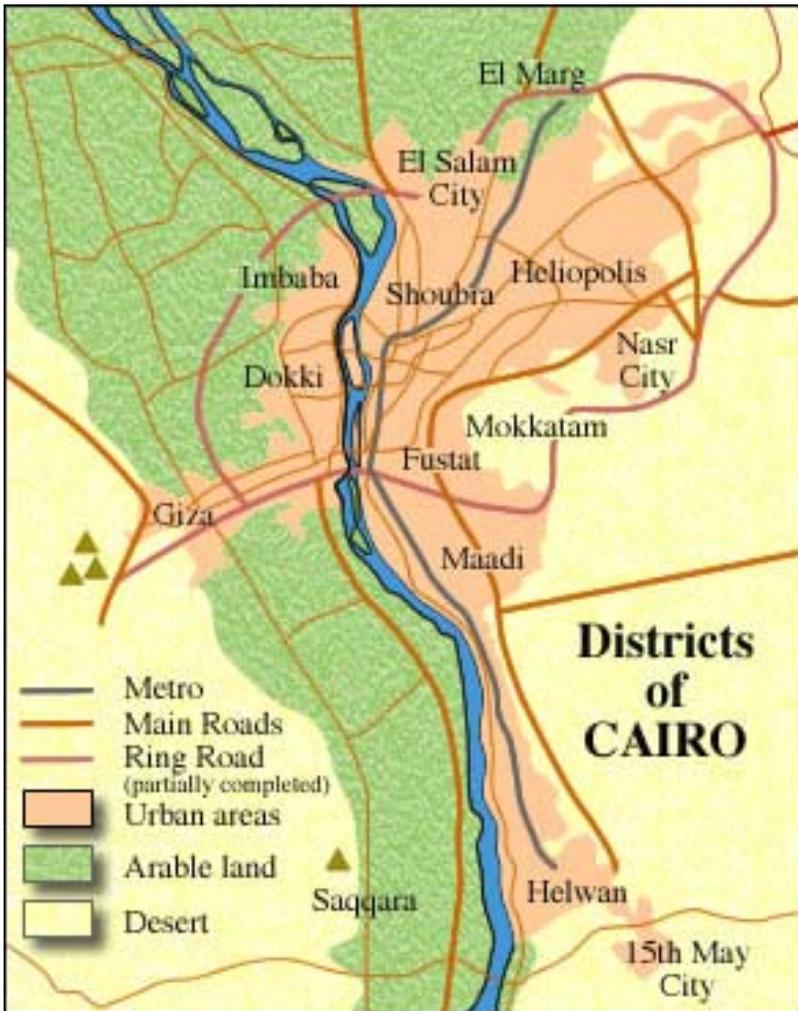

Map of Egypt



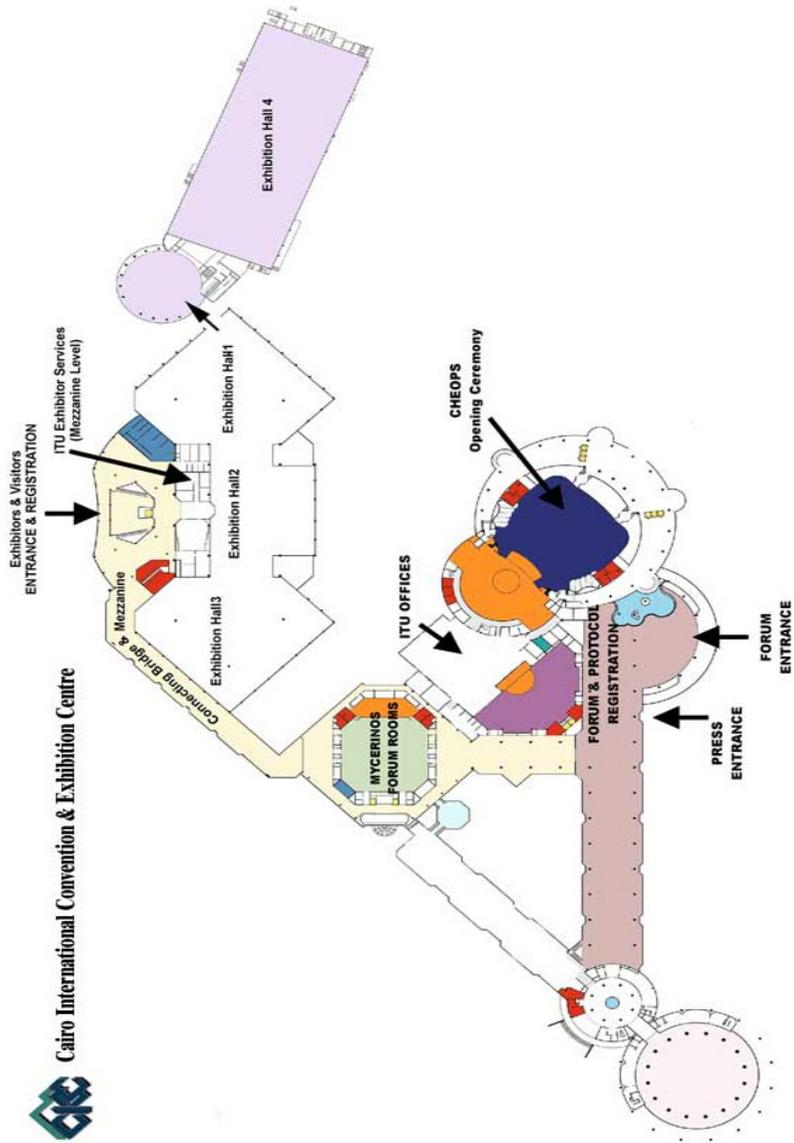
Location map
