This session looked at the practical example of a project led by the European Space Agency (ESA) and AB5 Consulting concerning the opportunities created by the new satellite constellations, such as OneWeb, in developing applications and services which will be for the benefits of all, in particular in e-Government (birth registration), smart agriculture (weather stations services), disaster management, and logistics/transport.

The workshop addressed all the WSIS Action lines from C1 to C11 as it covered the underlying infrastructure, looked at the regulatory/legal, economical, sociological context, exchanged with the audience on good practice in order to develop pilot projects which are developed to be translated as sustainable solutions.

  - b. a solution which should be easy to implement, maintain and with a low cost
  - c. train the users and encourage them to train others on the solution
  - d. favour co-development, open source code, development of modules
