The National Digital and Future Skills Strategy provides an analysis of the digital skills needs in the country taking into account the skills required for the future and outlining key recommendations for a cohesive approach to implementation. The strategic focus is to address the skills revolution as it impacts South Africa with the intention of taking a future-orientated and collaborative implementation approach inclusive of all sectors namely; education sector, society, private sector, as well as labour. The strategy sets out a foundational perspective on the nature of competencies required for the future of work in the context of the emerging digital technologies.

The National Digital and Future Skills Strategy is inter- and cross-sectoral in nature and recommends strategic interventions which are to be implemented by various stakeholders and government departments. The Education sector (inclusive of government departments & entities, private training providers, business institutes and education training authorities) is a very important pillar within the ecosystem of digital skills development and the recommendations of the Digital and Future Skills Strategy will find expression in the plans of these entities.

The Department of Communications and Digital Technologies (DCDT) is developing a comprehensive 5 year Digital and Future Skills Implementation Programme which unpacks the implementation of the recommendations of the strategy through coordinated institutional mechanism and partnership. The implementation of the National Digital and Future Skills Strategy will require the involvement of relevant Government departments, their implementing entities, private sector and civil society. The emphasis of the Strategy is directed towards coordination and alignment between the various Government skills plans and strategies as well as the Private Sector. The DCDT will work with the International Telecommunication Union (ITU), International Labour Organisation (ILO) and United Nations Development Program (UNDP), to support a South African programme of the 'Digital Skills for Decent Jobs for Youth', global campaign.

The unprecedented consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic have made the need for digital skills society even more important. In that regard it is critical to develop strategies to provide guidance on re-skilling the workforce in order to minimise the impact of job losses due to lack of skills relevant for the emerging fourth industrial revolution. The Digital Skills Strategy provides strategic interventions to promote creativity and inculcate the culture of problem solving using digital skills. It pays attention to the whole of society, all income groups, all age groups, within the context of digital transformation. The interventions suggest creative and collaborative approaches to promote a digitally skilled society.

Successful implementation of the strategy has implications for economy, society and education. It calls on the education sectors inclusive of SETAs to build a strong focus and invest in digital skills as well as invest in the development of digital innovation skills, including agriculture, mining, manufacturing, postal services, and health services to mention a few.

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
